COTER commission conference on The future of Cohesion policy beyond 2020

Warsaw (Poland), 3 March 2017

Cohesion policy is the key European instrument to ensure the promotion of economic, social and territorial cohesion within the European Union and is one of the most visible EU policies at local and regional level, demonstrating the benefits of Europe to its citizens. Cities and regions are the primary beneficiaries of EU cohesion policy. The future of Cohesion policy beyond 2020 is therefore one of the key issues for European cities and regions. The European Committee of the Regions is about to position itself on this crucial matter with the elaboration of its own-initiative opinion on the future of Cohesion policy beyond 2020, in order to channel the concerns of European cities and regions into the interinstitutional debate on the future Cohesion policy, which is currently gaining momentum. It is therefore the right time to enter into a wider discussion on how the future Cohesion policy should be shaped from the perspective of Europe's cities and regions.

Cohesion policy, which is based on the Treaty objective of strengthening economic, social and territorial cohesion in order to promote an overall harmonious development of the European Union, is an essential pillar of the Single Market and the European integration process as a whole. By addressing existing imbalances and focusing on long-term regional development, it aims to ensure a fair chance to reap the benefits of the European integration for everyone everywhere in the EU. However, in recent years the scope of Cohesion Policy has increasingly shifted towards achieving other EU objectives, whilst at the same time the economic and financial crisis has led to increased regional disparities, both between European regions, and between regions within Member States. The first session of the conference will therefore facilitate a political discussion on which overall focus and narrative the future Cohesion policy should have, in order to successfully meet the upcoming challenges for our cities and regions.
